









**Wolves and Stalks** 



In their tense standoff, an unexpected sound from the haystack sends both the farmer and the wolf running in panic. Who will emerge as the victor in this psychological battle?



## The Nine Sons of the Dragon


The book retells the ancient Chinese folk tale of 'A dragon has nine sons, none alike.' Born to the dragon king couple in heaven, each baby dragon possesses unique strengths but lacks spell control. Their missteps lead to a catastrophic flood, prompting them to descend to earth under their parents' guidance. Through remedying their errors and aiding mortals, the dragon sons mature, learn spell control, and embrace their fairy responsibilities. Returning to heaven, they safeguard world peace while their legend spreads among people, inspiring the design of dragon son images symbolizing peace and prosperity.

**WU Jianhua**, a picture book illustrator since the 1980s, has published numerous acclaimed works both domestically and internationally, receiving prestigious awards for his art. **ZHANG Weicai**, a picture book illustrator and sculptor, created notable sculptures and collaborated with Wu Jianhua on numerous picture books. **XU Cui**, a picture book author and illustrator, has received numerous awards for works like "Frog and Swan," "Two Geniuses," and "Waiting."

Hyalodale is an imaginary place, a world that existed before the real world appeared. Everything there is colorless and transparent until the colors fall on them one by one and the world becomes bright. What will happen when each color runs into the cloud, trees, animals and valley? How about our tears?

**Dai Yun** is an author, translator, and publicist who specializes in children's books. Nanjing is where she grew up after being born in Zhejiang. In addition to Sudan's Rhino Horn, her published works include Where Have the Stinky Socks Gone?, The White Witch's Garden, Little Tadpole Buys Airplane, The Walking Chicken.

**Iwona Chmielewska**, a Polish picture book author, was shortlisted for Hans Christian Andersen Award for four times. She has won the Best Children's Book Award at the Bologna Children's Book Fair for three times and Bratislava International Biennial (BIB) Golden Apple Award. She is a forward-looking and innovative artist. Her works are famous for their novelty, uniqueness, creativity, imagination and philosophical depth.



**Cao Gezi**, a writer and artist born in Beijing and currently residing in New York, initiated the "Lonely Girls of New York" project in 2014 and published the novel "I Want All the Love in the World." Her artwork, "American Experiment," is currently on display at the National Museum of the United States. She is also actively working on her upcoming non-fiction novel and picture book.

This heartwarming tale not only showcases A-Tu's efforts to rectify her mistake but also introduces readers to various ceramic-making techniques, including the unique art of "kiln-fired" ceramic restoration.

Yang Huiwen graduated from the Central Academy of Fine Arts with a degree in Illustration and pursued her master's degree at the University of the Arts London. Passionate about storytelling, picture books, and traditional porcelain craftsmanship, Yang created the picture book "A-Tu's Little Porcelain Bowl" during her exploration of China's porcelain capital, Jingdezhen. The book was exhibited at the 2015 "Illustrations Tell the Story" Exhibition at the Capital Library and the 22nd Beijing International Book Fair. Before its publication, the book received the "Zhang Leping Picture Book Award Honorable Mention." Yang has also published the "Chinese Folk Tales Series: Twelve Princesses."

# A Boy on the Road



**Qu Lan** was born and raised in China and has been living in France after graduation from the China Academy of Art. She works as freelance illustrator & designer and collaborates with numerous publishers and companies. Her artwork has been exposed regularly and received worldwide awards, such as Prix Janusz Korczak, Prix du Livre Jeunesse Marseille and etc.


